SSAF Consultation and Achievements

Consultation with students

Students and student representatives were invited via email to participate in one of two All Student Forums to have input into the services and amenities that are funded through the Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) and to discuss the proposed 2022 USQ Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) Strategic Framework.

Outcome of consultation

Feedback from the consultation process informed the University's identified key priority areas around student services, focusing on supporting students to develop the necessary skills and capabilities to succeed in their studies; enhancing the employability and career goals for students; and offering effective services around health, well-being and sport. Specific key areas of focus included orientation for new students, the ongoing provision of timely advice, guidance and advocacy for all learners, and access to relevant leadership and professional development opportunities to aid student representation, participation and personal/professional development.

What steps were taken to ensure that SSAF revenue was expended in accordance with subsection 19-38(4) of the Higher Education Support Act 2003 (HESA)

Funding was expended on ongoing activities that have been funded over a number of years. Activities and services are reviewed against the SSAF categories and guidelines to ensure the funding is expended appropriately.

What SSAF funding achieved in the reported year

In 2022, SSAF delivered:

- Provision of Mental Health and Wellbeing activities through counselling sessions, Safer Communities, mental health and wellbeing activities.
- Delivery of on-campus Orientation events and engagement activities
- Student Representative Committees
- Advocacy provided through the UniSQ Student Guild
- Study and careers support
 - Student success advising services
 - Provided assignment assistance and advice through Learning Advisors
 - o Peer tutoring through PASS
 - Career counselling, resume editing
- Student leadership opportunities

The term "part-time basis" means a study load of less than 75 per cent of the normal full-time student load for the period to which the fee relates. As per part 7 of the Administration Guidelines, the normal EFTSL value for a full-time student studying over a period of one year is 1.0.

³ Note: Students are categorised as full-time or part-time students based on the total EFTSL value of the units of study they undertook in 2022. For example, a student undertook a full-time study load in Semester 1 which was equal to 0.5 EFTSL and undertook a part-time study load in Semester 2 which was equal to 0.375 EFTSL. This student would be categorised as a full-time student in 2022 as the total EFTSL they undertook in 2022 was equal to 0.875.
