Michael Kirby slams Morrison government's religious discrimination bill

Former High Court judge Michael Kirby has said the Morrison government's "unbalanced" draft religious discrimination bill will lead to "intolerance and hostility" in Australian society. In a letter to the Australian Law Journal, Kirby said the bill was born of "hostile religious assertions of a minority of conservative politicians" after same-sex marriage passed in 2017. MORE

New research shows religious debates taking heaving toll

New research shows that LGBTIQ Australians feel the current social situation, with the ongoing religious freedom debates, is worse now than during the 2017 same-sex marriage debate. A survey conducted by LGBTIQ advocacy group, just.equal shows that LGBTIQ Australians and their allies feel the current religious discrimination and transgender debates are "payback" for marriage equality. However, the survey also indicates that this is only one reason that LGBTIQ Australians feel under attack. MORE

Police in Uganda have arrested around 120 LGBTIQ people in a raid on a bar known as a safe haven for the queer community in the African country. The raid happened at the RAM Bar in Uganda's capital Kampala, during a weekly LGBTIQ gathering at the venue. MORE

Dozens of students at a California Catholic high school staged a walkout after teachers threatened to out a gay classmate to her parents if she didn't attend counselling due to her sexual orientation. MORE

Sacked Wallabies star Israel Folau has yet again caused controversy with comments about homosexuality, this time linking the bushfire crisis and drought in NSW and Queensland to same-sex marriage. In a sermon posted to the Facebook page of the Truth of Jesus Christ Church Sydney, Folau said the fires were related to passing of marriage equality in Australia, and the recent legalisation of abortion in NSW. Ever wondered what to do if someone close to you was having a mental health emergency? Could you recognise the early warning signs of a mental health problem? Would know where to send someone for help? Interested in having a mental health qualification to add to your resume?

Mental health first aid is the help provided to a person who is developing a mental health problem or who is in a mental health crisis. Like physical first aid, mental health first aid is given until the person receives professional help or until the crisis resolves.

USQ is offering FREE MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING to all students over

the age of 18. This two day training program will teach you:

- How to recognise the signs and symptoms of mental health problems
- To help people in the early stages of these problems
- Where and how to refer people to get help
- Understand what types of help are effective
- Know how to assist in a mental health crisis until professional help arrives.
