Visually, the positive impacts of landscape rehydration works implemented in south-west Queensland are clear. But what impact do these works have on soil condition? Our Regional Soil Coordinator Cameron Leckie has been helping

Southern Queensland Landscapes and UniSQ soil microbiologist Dr Elaine Gough in a project to help answer that question.

"In terms of both vegetation and soil structure across each



station, it is obvious that the landscape rehydration works have made a substantial positive difference," Cameron says. <u>Read the full article here</u>.

Customising weather index insurance offerings

University of Southern Queensland's Jenny Wang has been awarded a \$431,000 Australian Research Council fellowship to help customise weather index insurance offerings, and will work in partnership with CelsiusPro on the project. Dr Wang will identify a machine learning algorithm which can detect drought events using satellite image data, and then develop location specific drought indicators which can be used to provide more accurate coverage. Working together for a drought-proof future

The Australian Government is leading the discussion on drought preparedness and response, with consultation underway on a new national drought plan. Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, Murray Watt said the review into the national drought plan-which means fresh ideas and new voices have explored hands-on approaches to managing drought. \$11m in grants to enhance ag credentials

Australian farmers will be assisted to prove the premium quality, sustainability, and First Nations credentials of their produce through \$11 million in grants from the Australian Government. "(Traceability) helps Australia to access valuable international export markets which are increasingly demanding evidence of sustainable, climate-smart practices. It also assists our biosecurity systems through detailed data and tracking of produce and supports the move to cleaner, greener agriculture," Federal Ag Minister Murray Watt said. Read more.

As way of example, one speaker pointed to an early stage startup using off the shelf drone technology and software to monitor stock location, numbers and condition all from the front porch. 
